Every April, the College of the Redwoods Child Development Center (CDC) brings awareness to the prevention of child abuse. 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Wild Souls Ranch Therapeutic Equine-assisted Growth and **Learning Services**

I've been thinking a lot about what makes Wild Souls Ranch so effective as a form of emotional growth and learning, and the list is quite long. What is helpful for one child may be different for another, which is why we cater our sessions to help meet the goals of each individual youth. However, one element that I kept returning to is the idea of willing participation and motivation.



or that they're in trouble, it makes them less likely to be present during the session. But what happens when you take a child to a ranch and put them in front of a horse? By simply existing, the horse commands attention and presence in a nonjudgmental way, which enables the child meaningfully engage their session.

traditional Often. therapy can be seen as drove this point home for strange and unusual for me. From the moment the hindering youth, ability to get the most out the ranch, it was clear that of it. working with potentially riding a horse someday did something extraordinary to this child. They were immediately more engaged, motivated, and collaborative than they had been before. realized there was something they wanted to accomplish, and started to imagine how to get there. Additionally. because of the size and nature of the horse, the child was more respectful and mindful around and towards the horse than they had been toward people and other animals. As the sessions evolved and progress was made toward riding the horse. witnessed much SO emotional growth and learning in this child. In

collaboration with our highly skilled mental health staff and the horse, this youth experienced therapeutic mental health services in a unique and profound way. It became clear to me that the horse warranted monumental buy-in from this child – and the results followed.

Although healing and growth are not linear, showing up for and participating in the work is the best way to keep the child moving toward their goals and in turn a healthier life long-term. The horse is such a natural teacher, and everything we do at Wild Souls Ranch is modeled after that connection with a strong focus on respect and collaboration.



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Make Your Own Pinwheel

Here's a craft project that will allow children a chance to participate in your community's Pinwheels for Prevention activities. This activity can be used in schools, daycare centers, after-school programs, etc.

Materials

- a push pin
- a square piece of construction paper (about 8.5" x 8.5")
- a sharpened pencil with an eraser
- scissors

Directions

- 1. Lay the square paper flat on a table and draw a line diagonally from each corner to the opposite corner.
- 2. Mark the center of the square where the two lines cross and punch a small hole through it with the pencil tip.
- 3. Next, cut along each line stopping about an inch from the hole in the center of the square.
- 4. Take the pin and punch a hole in the top left corner of each of the four flaps. (No two holes should be next to each other.)
- 5. Pick-up a flap at a punched corner and carefully curve it over toward the center hole, securing it with the pin.
- 6. Repeat this for the other flaps.
- 7. When all four flaps are held by the pin, carefully lift the paper without letting the flaps unfurl.
- 8. Lay the pencil flat on a table and carefully push the point of the push pin into the side of the eraser.
- 9. Now your pinwheel is complete and ready to go. Pick up the pinwheel near the pencil point and let it catch the wind.
